

Qualify for Lifeline

A Guide for Consumers Using the National Verifier

HOW IT WORKS

<u>Lifeline</u> is a federal program that lowers the monthly cost of phone and internet. Consumers now have more ways to check if they qualify for Lifeline.

In <u>some states</u>, customers can apply for Lifeline using the National Verifier. You can apply with the National Verifier through a service provider, by mail, or online using the consumer portal at <u>CheckLifeline.org</u>.

HOW TO APPLY (Choose One Option):

Through a Lifeline Company

Visit a Lifeline phone or internet company near you.

They will ask you for information to check your eligibility.

You can find a list of service providers using the <u>Companies</u>
<u>Near Me</u> tool on USAC's website.

Type in your zip code to see a list of companies that offer the Lifeline benefit in your area.

By Mail

Mail in your finished <u>Lifeline</u>
<u>Application</u>, <u>Household Worksheet</u>,
and copies of your proof of

USAC will contact you by email from <u>LifelineSupport@usac.org</u> or mail from the Lifeline Support Center to let you know if you qualify for Lifeline.

If the National Verifier cannot check your eligibility, you will need to mail in more documents to the Lifeline Support Center.

Online

Visit the consumer portal, CheckLifeline.org, and create an account. You can fill out a Lifeline application online.

You will find out if you are eligible for Lifeline through the consumer portal immediately after applying online.

If the National Verifier cannot prove your eligibility automatically, you will need to upload more documents to the consumer portal.

You may need a copy of a document that proves your income is at or below 135% of the federal poverty guidelines or that you participate in **one** of these programs:

- SNAP
- Medicaid
- Public Housing Assistance
- · Veterans Pension and Survivors Benefit
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- · Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance
- Tribal Head Start
- Tribal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (Tribal TANF)
- Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations

You may also need a copy of:

- An item to prove your identity, such as an unexpired government issued ID:
 - Driver's License, passport, or state or Tribal issued ID
- A copy of an item to prove your address:
 - Map screenshot from an internet source (such as Google Maps) with an icon of your residence, address or street name, and coordinates

RENEW EACH YEAR

<u>You must recertify every year</u>. If the National Verifier cannot recertify you, USAC will contact you with instructions to recertify. If you do not respond, you will lose your benefit.





About Lifeline

Lifeline is a benefit that lowers the monthly cost of phone or internet service (not both). You are only allowed to get one Lifeline benefit per household, not per person.

What this worksheet is for

Use this worksheet if someone else at your address gets Lifeline. The answers to these questions will help you find out if there is more than one household at your address.

What is a household?

A household is a group of people who live together and share income and expenses (even if they are not related to each other).

Examples of one household:

- A married couple who live together are one household. They must share one Lifeline benefit.
- A parent/guardian and child who live together are one household. They must share one Lifeline benefit.
- An adult who lives with friends or family who financially support him/her are one household. They must share one Lifeline benefit.

Examples of more than one household:

- 4 roommates who live together but do not share money are 4 households. They can have one Lifeline benefit each, 4 total.
- 30 seniors who live in an assisted-living home are 30 households. They can have one Lifeline benefit each, 30 total.

Household expenses

A household shares expenses. Household expenses include, but are not limited to, food, healthcare expenses, and the cost of renting or paying a mortgage on your place of residence and utilities.

Income

Households share income. Income includes salary, public assistance benefits, social security payments, pensions, unemployment compensation, veteran's benefits, inheritances, alimony, child support payments, worker's compensation benefits, gifts, and lottery winnings.

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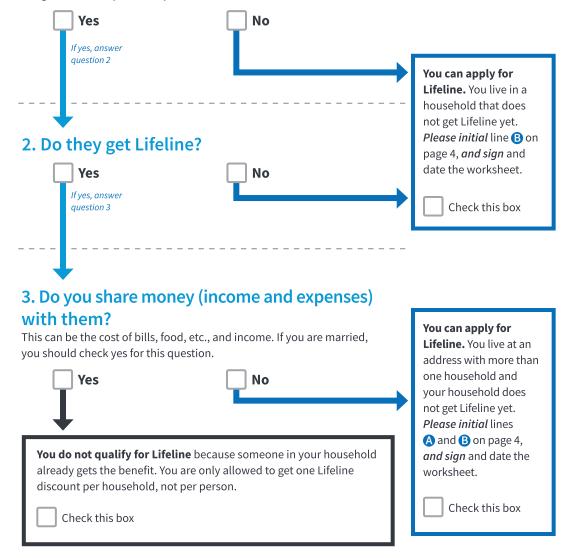


Can you apply?

Follow this decision tree to confirm if you qualify for the Lifeline Program.

1. Do you live with another adult?

Adults are people who are 18 years old or older, or who are emancipated minors. This can include a spouse, domestic partner, parent, adult son or daughter, adult in your family, adult roommate, etc.

Notice

NOTICE: Section 54.410 of the Federal Communications Commission's rules requires all Lifeline subscribers to demonstrate their eligibility to receive Lifeline services. If more than one person at the same address is applying for Lifeline service, all applicants must submit a Household Worksheet. This collection of information stems from the Commission's authority under Section 254 of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, 47 U.S.C. §254. Using this authority, the FCC has designated USAC as the permanent Lifeline Administrator. About Lifeline

Lifeline is a federal benefit that lowers the monthly cost of phone or internet service.

Rules

If you qualify, your household can get Lifeline for phone or internet service, but not both.

- If you get Lifeline for phone service, you can get the benefit for one mobile phone or one home phone, but not both.
- If you get Lifeline for internet service, you can get the benefit for your mobile phone or your home connection, but not both.
- If you get Lifeline for bundled phone and internet service, you can get the benefit for your mobile phone bundled service or your home bundled service, but not both.

Your household cannot get Lifeline from more than one phone or internet company.

You are only allowed to get one Lifeline benefit per household, **not per person**. If more than one person in your household gets Lifeline, you are breaking the FCC's rules and will lose your benefit.

What is a household?

A household is a group of people who live together and share income and expenses (even if they are not related to each other).

Do not give your benefit to another person

Lifeline is non-transferable. You cannot give your Lifeline benefit to another person, even if they qualify.

Be honest on this form

You must give accurate and true information on this form and on all Lifeline-related forms or questionnaires. If you give false or fraudulent information, you will lose your Lifeline benefit (i.e., de-enrollment or being barred from the program) and the United States government can take legal actions against you. This may include (but is not limited to) fines or imprisonment.

You may need to show other documents

If the Lifeline Program Administrator is not able to prove you or someone in your household qualify using this form and electronic databases, you may need to show an official document from one of the government qualifying programs or to prove your annual income. You can submit copies of your official documents with this application or wait until the Lifeline Program Administrator asks you for them. To add them now, include the documents in option 1 or option 2 below:

- **1.** If you qualify through a government program: copies of your state ID card and an official document from the programs you are qualifying though (your SNAP card, Medicaid card, etc.)
- **2.** If you qualify through your income: copies of your state ID card and pay stubs for 3 consecutive months (or other accepted documents).
